 world fair -*l'Exposition Universelle* that took place in 1889 to celebrate the
 centenary of the storming of the Bastille in 1789. The storming of the Bastille prison
 in Paris was an event that marked the start of the French Revolution.

- 2. What kind of structure is *le Pont du Gard*? It is part of an ancient Roman aqueduct that crosses the River Gard in Occitanie.

What is le castellum? It is the ancient Roman well/reservoir that collected the water from the aqueduct for the city of Nîmes.

3. Name the boy who organised the building of the bridge of Avignon. Saint Bénézet, also known as le Petit Benoît.

How many arches of the bridge still stand? four

The bridge was constructed to span which river? the River Rhône

4. Which saint is associated with Lourdes? Saint Bernadette

Name the town's famous grotto. the Grotto of Massabielle Why is the grotto so famous? Inside the cave, there is a spring of water that is believed to have miraculous healing powers. The spring was discovered by a girl called Marie-Bernarde Soubirous in 1858. She is known as Saint Bernadette.

 5. What does the name 'Moulin Rouge' actually mean? It means: Red Mill. There is a decorative, red windmill on the outside of the building. Which artist portrayed scenes at *le Moulin Rouge*? Toulouse Lautrec Le Moulin Rouge is situated in which area of Paris? The area of Paris is: Montmartre. The road is called: *le boulevard de Clichy*.

6. Le Musée du Louvre is a famous art gallery and museum in Paris. At which métro train station should you stop if visiting the museum? Palais-Royal - Musée du Louvre Name the famous painting by Leonardo da Vinci that is kept there. Mona Lisa, known as la Joconde in French.

Which construction was added to the museum in 1989? A glass pyramid called *la Pyramide du Louvre* was added to commemorate the 200th anniverary of the beginning of the French Revolution in 1789.

 Corsica is a large French island. Where is it situated? It is situated in the Mediterranean Sea, 170km from the French coast and 12 km from the Italian island Sardinia.

Which queen spent a lot of time in the villa? Queen Marie-Antoinette

9. L'Arc de Triomphe is a monument that stands in which place in Paris? It stands in the centre of an area designed as a 12-pointed star. This area is called *la Place de l'Étoile*. There are twelve roads running from the central roundabout. When the area is viewed from the air, it has the design of a star with the monument in the centre. What will you find beneath the monument? You will find the Tomb of the Unknown

Soldier / la Tombe du Soldat Inconnu, from the First World War.

Who designed the arch? Jean Chalgrin

10. In which area of France is le Mont-Saint-Michel situated? the région of Normandie

Which bishop was commanded by St. Michael to build a church on the mount's summit? Aubert, the Bishop of Avranches. He is known as Saint Aubert.

According to a legend, what happened to the bishop's skull? The Archangel Michael touched the bishop's head with his finger, causing a fingertip-shaped, round hole in the bishop's skull!

- a. Which two buildings in Paris were opened in the year 1889? the Eiffel Tower and le Moulin Rouge
- b. Which place in France has a smaller replica in England? *Le Mont Saint-Michel* has a smaller replica in Cornwall, England. It is called St. Michael's Mount.
- c. The nickname la Dame de Fer refers to which building? It means the Iron Lady and it refers to the Eiffel Tower.
- d. When a place is labelled with the words le Patrimoine Mondial, what does this mean? It means that it has the status of a UNESCO World Heritage Site.
- e. What is le Gave de Pau? It is a river that flows through the town of Lourdes.
- f. Which flag portrays a person wearing a white bandana? The flag of Corsica.
- g. What is la Fontaine d'Eure? It is an area of water springs used as the source for the aqueduct built by the Ancient Romans to transport water for a distance of 50km to the town of Nîmes. A small, famous part of the aqueduct is called *le Pont du Gard* (where it spans the River Gard).
- h. Which building stands in an area called le Champ-de-Mars? the Eiffel Tower
- i. Which place was originally called le Mont Tombe? le Mont Saint-Michel
- j. Which construction also has a little chapel dedicated to St. Nicholas? the Bridge of Avignon
- k. The French King, Louis XIV, created which building? He designed le château de Versailles, transforming the already-existing hunting lodge into a magnificent palace.
